Did you know...

- The age for the right to vote in Ontario provincial elections was lowered from 21 to 18 in 1971?
- Persons with no permanent housing were only given the right to vote in provincial elections in Ontario in 1998?
- In Ontario, you can vote before election day at an advance voting location or the returning office for your electoral district? You can also vote by mail.

Registering to Vote in the Ontario Provincial Election

- Canadian citizens residing in Ontario who will be at least 18 years old on election day can use eRegistration to add themselves to the voters list, or to quickly and easily confirm that their information is up to date.
- Registering early means a voter will be mailed a voter information card with personalized information about when and where to vote once an election has been called.
- Voters who aren't yet on the voters list can register in person when they go to vote.

On election day...

- Bring your voter information card with you when you go to vote. You'll also need one piece of ID showing your name to receive a ballot.
- If you are not on the voters list, you will not receive a voter information card and must present one piece of ID showing both your name and current residential address to register and receive a ballot.
